#### **Setting Future Directions for Warragul North Primary School**

The school review days for 2018 have been completed. The review panel spent four days (18th October, 22nd October, 24th October and 29th October) at Warragul North Primary School and assessed the school against its 2015 – 2018 School Strategic Plan. Panel members conducted interviews with PLC Leaders and teachers. Panel members also met with student focus groups from each year level for Year Three to Year Six and Junior School Council.

Our appointed reviewer, Zenda Clark, will write a review report for Warragul North Primary School which will be presented to School Council. Once the report is received we will use its recommendations to write the 2019 – 2022 School Strategic Plan.

## Hello from the Acorn Room



We may sincerely love our children and assume our children know this, but my question to you, is does your child really know they are loved? Sometimes we can get stuck in a negative pattern of relating in families. Siblings bicker and fight, we are rushing to get to places on time, our child might do the same

irritating thing over and over again, tensions rise... It's easy to fall into ways of relating which fail to show our children how much we actually love them. But this is the single greatest thing you can do for your child.

So how can we effectively convey love to children in the midst of the busyness of life? How do we balance this alongside the need to correct and guide our children in the choices they make, especially when some children can make numerous poor choices? Withholding love is never an effective discipline strategy. Children learn best when they feel safe and secure in our love. It is important we keep looking for opportunities to demonstrate our love to our kids. Even if this means holding them to the consequences of their misbehavior at the same time.

Find the positives, and tell your kids whenever you think of something you love about them. Be specific with your compliments. Really listen to your child. Give them your full attention when you can. Validate their feelings. Things may seem trivial to us with our grown up perspective on the world, but to them, these 'small' things can be a big deal.

If it's not a good time for you and your attention is divided in some way, affirm your child that you do want to hear what they have to say, and commit to giving your child another opportunity to talk about it, and then make sure you follow through. Hug them, kiss them, give them high fives. Taking time from your regular schedule to do something special together is wonderful, but don't worry if time or finances limit this, there are still plenty of ways to show children how much you love them every day.

Representatives from Yoralla were helpful in answering queries regarding the electronic sign in/sign out process used at OSHC services. Discussion was held and ideas shared on activities that can be incorporated into our programs for older children.

Don't forget the new Child Care Package came into effect on 1st July so please make sure you have provided all your necessary information to Centrelink via myGov. For more information on this process please visit education.gov.au/ childcare OSHC is available on a permanent or casual basis. Some sessions are fully booked and a waiting list is held for those sessions. Please remember that the Office or OSHC must be notified if your child is not going to attend a session they have been booked in for. That place can then be used for a casual booking.

Once you have a permanent booking you will be billed for that placement whether your child attends or not.

#### **TERM FOUR UNIFORM REMINDER**





### WNPS Waste Audit

Perhaps one of the greatest challenges in the future, is how an expanding population will support itself with limited resources. Earth's current population: over seven billion people. By 2050: the population is estimated to hit ten billion.

Students were exposed to this problem during our Waste Audit on Friday 26th October.

They were shown that much of our waste comes from timber (paper products), mines (tins, etc.), or oil reserves (plastics), and these require areas of wilderness to be removed. Much of this is being used at a rapid rate by the world's population. The world is currently unsustainable with our use of these resources.

During the Waste Audit, staff and students from the Environment and Sustainability Group, teamed up with our ResourceSmart facilitator, Simone Taylor, and parent volunteers, to look at how we can be a part of the solution to the problem.

With the glamourous job of collecting and sorting the school's waste over a two-day period, the group then showed the school what we currently do with our waste. The result? Most of the items placed into our bins could be classified as 'resources' and can be recycled. Obvious items such as paper and hard plastics were amongst the waste, along with lesser known recyclables, flexible plastics (chip packets, etc.), that can be recycled at local supermarkets. There was a significant collection of organic waste, which we will soon be able to turn into compost with our school's Worm Farm.

The idea of a 'closed loop' was introduced, where a product's life doesn't end once it has been finished with - it can be recycled and remade into new products. In doing so, we do less damage to the planet and sustain our resources for future populations.

Staff and students gained valuable knowledge from the experience. We would like to thank our ResourceSmart facilitator, Simone Taylor, for her support. The school has recently signed up as a ResourceSmart school and will be working towards developing school-wide sustainable practices.

A huge thankyou to our parent volunteers Kylie McNair, Aimee Beck and Michelle Burge; the day would not have run as seamlessly without your assistance. Congratulations to Sabine from 6PR who recently achieved a third place overall in the Victorian State Rhythmic Gymnastics

Championships. Sabine competed in three disciplines, the ball, the hoop, and freehand, achieving fourth, third, and seventh respectively to finish third overall.

## **School Costs 2019**

The schools costs for 2019 were confirmed at the October meeting of School Council.

Statements will be posted out to all families at the beginning of 2019 with payment due as soon as possible. Families wishing to pay in two instalments should pay the first instalment by the end of February and the second instalment by the end of Term Two.

Families who are in receipt of a Centrelink payment (e.g. Family Tax Benefit, Parenting Payment, etc) are able to set up a Centrepay facility to pay their school account in fortnightly instalments. Please call at the school office for further information or to set up Centrepay.

#### WARRAGUL NORTH PRIMARY SCHOOL SCHOOL COSTS 2019:

The school charges for the 2019 year as set by School Council are as follows:

#### \$200.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION) \$190.00 (PER STUDENT YEARS 1 - 6)

To ensure all WNPS students have the stationery supplies needed for the academic year the Warragul North School Council makes a bulk purchase from reputable suppliers on behalf of parents. This

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ensures parents are able to purchase their child's supplies very cost effectively and easily. The bulk purchase also means all students have the same supplies (e.g. pencils, pens, rulers, paper, paint, glue, etc). This cost also includes materials and equipment for Visual Arts, Performing Arts and Physical Education. On the school account statement that parents receive the student supplies are charged as 'Essential Education Items' as per the Department of Education guidelines.

#### MATHS PORTAL (MATHS ONLINE) \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

Maths Online is an educational website catering for Kindergarten through to Year 12. Maths Online enables children to use tutorials to learn and revise a large range of topics. It has a comprehensive Australian K - 12 curriculum with more than 1400 animated and narrated mathematics lessons, a bank of tests and instant feedback to students. Once payment has been made a personal password is issued allowing access 24 hours, seven days a week.

#### ENGLISH PORTAL (WUSHKA) \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

Wushka is an online levelled school reading program which helps students learn to read and includes an extensive selection of fiction and non-fiction levelled school readers. Every levelled reader has an online comprehension quiz and printable teacher support material. Teachers manage their own class, easily setting class reading levels, reading groups and choosing readers to read at home. Once payment has been made a personal password is issued allowing access 24 hours, seven days a week.

#### HEADPHONES \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

For use in classrooms with laptops, i-Pads, i-Pods and audio equipment. Students will use the headphones during Digital Technology lessons. Headphones are to be retained from year to year.



#### MEMORY STICK \$20.00 (PER STUDENT YEARS 3 - 6)

For use at school and home to enable students to store their school work. These are supplied with a Warragul North Primary School lanyard. Memory sticks are to be retained from year to year.

#### GROUNDS MAINTENANCE CHARGE \$35.00 (PER FAMILY)

Parents are keen to see the school's buildings and grounds properly maintained in order to provide their children with a clean, tidy and safe learning environment. To assist in achieving this goal payment of the grounds maintenance charge will allow the school to engage paid labour.





The Buildings and Grounds sub-committee of School Council hold a minimum of two working bees each year. At Warragul North Primary School we recognise that parents cannot always be available on these days. The working bee charge enables families to contribute in lieu of attendance.

#### 'FOR THE RECORD' SCHOOL YEARBOOK \$30.00 (PER FAMILY)

The school yearbook is issued at the end of the year to the eldest child in each family. It is a fantastic record of the Warragul North Primary School year and includes photos of the many activities the children take part in during the year such as concerts, production, camps, excursions and incursions.



# WNPS Volunteers Policy

#### **PURPOSE**

To outline the processes that Warragul North Primary school will follow to recruit, screen, supervise and manage volunteers to provide a child safe environment, and to explain the legal rights of volunteers.

#### **DEFINITIONS**

Child-related work: work that usually involves direct contact (including in person, over the phone, written and online communication) with a child that is a central part of that person's duties. It does not include work that involves occasional contact with children that is incidental to the work.

Closely related family member: parent, carer, parent/carer's spouse or domestic partner, stepparent, parent/carer's mother or father in-law, grandparent, uncle or aunt, brother or sister, including step or half siblings.

*Volunteer worker:* A volunteer school worker is a person who voluntarily engages in school work or approved community work without payment or reward.

School work: School work means:

- Carrying out the functions of a school council
- Any activity carried out for the welfare of a school, by the school council, any parents' club or association or any other body organised to promote the welfare of the school
- Any activity carried out for the welfare of the school at the request of the principal or school council
- Providing assistance in the work of any school or kindergarten
- Attending meetings in relation to government schools convened by any organisation which receives government financial support

This is a broad definition and means that volunteers who participate in school community activities, such as fundraising and assisting with excursions, are legally protected (ie indemnified) from action by others in the event of an injury or accident whilst they are performing volunteer school work in good faith.

#### **POLICY**

Warragul North Primary School is committed to implementing and following practices which protect the safety and wellbeing of children and our staff and volunteers. The procedures set out in this policy are designed to ensure that Warragul North Primary School's volunteers are suitable to work with children and are well-placed to make a positive contribution to our school community.

#### Working with students

Warragul North Primary School values the many volunteers that assist in our classrooms/with sports events/camps/excursions/school concerts/other events and programs. To ensure that we are meeting our legal obligations under the *Working With Children Act 2005* (Vic) and the Child Safe Standards, Warragul North Primary School is required to undertake suitability checks which may include a Working With Children Check, proof of identity, work history involving children and/or reference checks.

Considering our legal obligations, and our commitment to ensuring that Warragul North Primary School is a child safe environment, we will require volunteers to hold a current WWC Check and have a copy of their valid card recorded by administration staff for verification in the following circumstances:

- Volunteers who are not parent/family members of any student at the school are required to have a WWC Check if they are engaged in child-related work regardless of whether they are being supervised.
- Parent/family volunteers who are assisting with any
  classroom or school activities involving direct contact
  with children in circumstances where the volunteer's
  child is not participating, or does not ordinarily
  participate in, the activity.
- Parent/family volunteers who assist with excursions (including swimming), camps and similar events, regardless of whether their own child is participating or not.
- Parent/family volunteers who regularly assist in school activities, regardless of whether their own child is participating or not

In addition, depending on the nature of the volunteer work, our school may ask the volunteer to provide other suitability checks at its discretion (for example, references, work history involving children and/or qualifications). Proof of identity may also be required in some circumstances.

#### Non child-related work

On some occasions, parents and other members of the school community may volunteer to do work that is not child-related. For example; volunteering on the weekend for gardening, maintenance, working bees, parents and friends club coordination, school council, participating in sub-committees of school council, fete coordination, other fundraising groups that meet in the evenings] during which children will not be, or would not reasonably be expected to be, present.

Volunteers for this type of work are not required to have Working with Children or other suitability checks as they are not engaged in child-related work and children are not generally present during these activities. However, Warragul North Primary School reserves the right to undertake suitability checks, including proof of identity, Working with Children Checks, at its discretion if considered necessary for any particular activities or circumstances.

School council members and volunteers on any subcommittee of school council will be required to provide a valid WWC Check. Whilst we acknowledge that these volunteers will not be engaging in child-related work as part of their role, we believe that it is important that our volunteers who are involved in making important decisions about our school which will have an impact on students do have a valid WWC Check.

#### Management and supervision

Volunteer workers will be expected to comply with any reasonable direction of the principal (or their nominee). This will include the requirement to follow our school's Statement of Commitment to Child Safety and our Child Safety Code of Conduct. The principal has the discretion to make a decision about the ongoing suitability of a volunteer worker and may determine at any time whether or not a person is suitable to volunteer at Warragul North Primary School.

Warragul North Primary School will provide any appropriate induction and/or training for volunteer workers. The principal (or their nominee) will determine what induction and/or training is necessary depending on what type of work the volunteer will be undertaking.

Volunteers will be provided induction in relation to Warragul North Primary School's child safety practices, including reporting obligations and procedures. The principal (or their nominee) will determine what

supervision, if any, of volunteers is required for the type of work being performed.

#### Compensation

#### Personal injury

Volunteer workers are covered by the Department of Education and Training's Workers Compensation Policy if they suffer personal injury in the course of engaging in school work.

#### Property damage

If a volunteer worker suffers damage to their property in the course of carrying out school work, the Minister (or delegate) may authorise such compensation as they consider reasonable in the circumstances. Claims of this nature should be directed to the principal who will direct them to the Department's Legal Division.

#### Public liability insurance


The Department of Education and Training's public liability insurance policy applies when a volunteer worker engaged in school work is legally liable for:

- a claim for bodily injury to a third party
- damage to or the destruction of a third party's property.

#### REVIEW CYCLE

This policy will be reviewed as part of the school's five year review cycle.

This policy was ratified by School Council in July 2018



### MUSIC: Count Us In!



Learning music at school makes a unique contribution to children's development. There have been countless studies that have linked music learning to improved academic and social outcomes. With this in mind,

consider that only 23% of Australian Government schools have a consistent, sequential and developmental music program.

'Music: Count Us In!' is a Federal Government initiative which started in 2007 to highlight this issue by having as many schools as possible, public and private, primary and secondary, singing a purpose written song (by

secondary students) on the same day at the same time across Australia. Last year over 600,000 children and 2,100 schools nationwide took part including over 600 students from Warragul North Primary School.

Warragul North Primary School has been involved for the past six years and this year will again take part at 12.30pm on Thursday, 1st November, when the whole school will come together to sing, 'One Song'.





#### Monash University Research Project

Warragul North Primary School has been approached by Monash University to be involved in their Project Magnet Research work. The project is aiming to help children with ASD and ADHD, to give them the best chance of good education, and a happy life.
