confidence, excellent expression, tone and volume variation and had thoroughly researched their topics.



PARKING | TRAFFIC FLOW DISABLED PARKING



Please be aware that the 'reserved' parking permit area near the administration building is for staff use only and permits must be displayed on the windscreen.

WNPS Environment and Sustainability News

'Towards Zero Waste' Update - CONGRATULATIONS 3CO!

You are the recipient of the Environment and Sustainability award for 'Creating Positive Change'

Congratulations to grade 3CO for their efforts in helping lead WNPS in becoming a 'Resource Smart, Sustainable School'.

3CO has reduced their waste in the following areas:

Organic Waste – 3CO started recycling their organic waste (food scraps) before our worm farms arrived at Warragul North. 3CO sends their food scraps home with Mrs Coghlan who feeds them to her chickens.

Recycling paper – They use the back of printed sheets to save paper. Mrs Coghlan also uses paper twice by using pre-printed sheets in the photocopier.

Flexible plastics – 'scrunchable plastics' from snacks and lunches are collected and sent to the local supermarket.

Bread Tags – Nina Nakamura has also started collecting bread tags in the grade. These go to Baw Baw Food Relief and then sent to Africa. These are then used to make wheelchairs.

What a great effort! Keep up the good work 3CO!

I wonder what your grade will do next to lead you to become a 'Zero Waste' classroom!

Please support our efforts to reduce our waste at school, by encouraging similar habits at home. If we think about reducing packaging and potentially uneaten food in lunchboxes, we will further reduce our waste.

Positive Impact Tip of the Week:

Chickens are a great asset to any home and can suit smaller backyards. They eat most scraps, including meat-based products. This can significantly reduce the amount of waste you send to landfill (food in landfill creates 'methane gas' which is 20% more potent than carbon dioxide in building up greenhouse gases). Add a compost bin or two, and you've just about eliminated any food waste from going into landfill.

CERES STUDENT ENVIRONMENTAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM INCURSION

A very engaging and educational experience was had by 30 Environment & Sustainability students who attended the CERES (Centre for Education and Research in Environmental Strategies) Student Environmental Leadership Program (or 'SELP') incursion on Wednesday 21st August.

Students performed a range of fun educational activities, and developed some future ideas for the school based on an audit of our waste procedures:

- Students looked at where products come from (for example, plastic from oil), and the time it takes human made products to break down in landfill (sometimes up to ten-thousand years). They learnt about the 5Rs (Rethink, Refuse, Reduce, Reuse and Recycle) and why these are important.
- They learnt that humans throw 'waste' away when they don't know what to do with an item after they have finished with it. There are often other alternatives to sending something to landfill by following the 5Rs.
- They also completed an audit of our school's waste procedures, and learnt that there are a number of ways our school can improve our waste practices.
 E&S students are now working on project ideas to improve these areas.
- Finally, students looked at one solution to our 'fast fashion' problem (cheap clothing, not made to last). They upcycled used t-shirts into cool bags.

It's these ideas and activities that help students see that there is a problem with the way the world 'wastes' and that there are easy and sometimes creative solutions to these problems.

I look forward to working with these students as they help lead our school towards becoming more sustainable.

Öld Gippstown Excursion

On Wednesday 21st August the Year One children visited Old Gippstown in Moe. Old Gippstown is a historic town with a collection of authentic buildings dating back from the 1840s through to the 1930s. The site covers 8 acres and features several National Trust classified buildings and one of the best collections of horse-drawn vehicles and farm equipment in Australia. It also includes the Dr Andrew's (the 'father' of Yallourn) collection and the Narracan Mechanics' Institute library.

The children were able to browse through the main street shops and soak up the atmosphere of Gippsland's past. They visited original relocated buildings and their collections such as pioneer Angus McMillan's 'Bushy Park' homestead and 'Rhoden's Halfway House' one of the few remaining Cobb & Co. inns in existence.

Old Gippstown's aim is to present the history of Gippsland, for the benefit of the present and future generations by preserving, researching, recording and presenting the unique collections in its care.

Children and Caffeine

Little research has been done on the effects of caffeine and children however

Caffeine is a stimulant that speeds up messages to and from the brain.

Preliminary research has shown increased side effects at levels as low as 50mg per day. Side effects reported include:

- Fatique
- Anxiety
- Increased blood pressure
- Sleep disturbances
- Headaches
- Irritability
- Bed wetting

How much caffeine is in drinks?

- Can of Cola 8mg
- Cup instant Coffee 20-80mg
- Can Red Bull 80mg

As limited evidence is available; it is recommended that children avoid drinks that contain caffeine (such as energy drinks) until the full effect of caffeine in children is known.
