Principal's Report cont.

NAPLAN 2022



The National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) was conducted during May this year. Recently the individual results for each Year Three and Year Five student were received and are available for collection from the WNPS Office.

The Year Three cohort results inform us about our teaching and learning in Foundation, Year One and Year Two at WNPS as the Year Three students sit the test three months into the academic year. Similarly, the Year Five cohort results inform us about our teaching and learning in Year Three and Year Four. NAPLAN is a whole school responsibility.

Overall, our WNPS results are very pleasing, and our students are to be congratulated on being engaged in their learning and hence achieving their learning goals.

The NAPLAN tests represent only one component of your child's overall assessment and needs to be considered within the context of the school assessment program. That is why at Warragul North Primary School we have a number of assessment tasks so that teachers build up a comprehensive picture of children's progress. In this way parents and teachers can consider all factors which contribute to a child's development – socially, emotionally, physically and intellectually.

NAPLAN is a 'point in time' assessment of literacy and numeracy achievement. NAPLAN results will generally give you a very good indication of your child's learning, but occasional anomalies do occur. It is possible, for example, that your child was unwell on the day of the test and did not perform to the best of their ability.

Your child's classroom teacher assesses all students' learning in literacy and numeracy on a regular basis. The NAPLAN test results are designed to complement this information, but not to replace it.

Parents of children in Year Five are reminded that secondary schools may request a copy of your child's Year Five NAPLAN results. It is suggested that you file these results in a safe place for future use.

We would also like to advise families that commencing 2023, NAPLAN will take place during Term one, not Term Two as in previous years. More information about NAPLAN will be available at the beginning of the 2023 school year.

Warragul North Primary School provides parents with student reports each term of the school year.


The Term Three reports are brief reports that provide information about learning in English and Mathematics, along with general information.

Dear Families,

On **Friday 9th September**, we are hosting **Footy Colours Day 2022**! Please encourage your child to dress up in colours that support their footy team (you can also wear colours that supports your favourite sport such as netball, basketball, soccer, gymnastics and many more). Students will engage in a variety of Footy Day activities both in and out of classroom such as designing their own guernsey, participating in The Longest Kick competition, our Footy Day parade and many more!!

Each year, more than 950 children and teenagers are diagnosed with cancer in Australia. On average, young learners with cancer are absent from school for up to six months during treatment and recovery.

This prolonged absence can result in devastating consequences at a crucial time in a young person's education, leading to life-long consequences. Many drop class levels when they return to school and find it difficult to reengage with their education, as well as becoming socially isolated.

The Fight Cancer Foundation caters to children and young people living with cancer who are undergoing or recovering from treatment. The program enables learners to maintain their education and connection with their school and school friends. The programs are delivered on oncology wards, out-patient clinics and through online applications.

Their team of teachers and support staff work with families and schools to develop individual support and learning plans that meet the educational, social and welfare needs of young learners. They also provide one-on-one tutoring, online learning sessions and group learning activities.

PARKING | TRAFFIC FLOW DISABLED PARKING



Please be aware that the 'reserved' parking permit area near the administration building is for staff use only and permits must be displayed on the windscreen.

If everyone adheres to the agreed parking areas and direction of traffic flow it creates a safer environment for children during drop off and pick up times.

Just a friendly reminder that the disabled parking space provided outside the administration building is for people with a disabled parking permit only. It is also requested that you be mindful of other people who use this space and not double park across it. Please do not park across this specially designated car space. Thank you.

Can I Park Here?

You are not allowed to park, stop or leave your vehicle:

- Double parked
- Within an intersection (except on the continuous side of a continuing road of a T-intersection)
- Fully or partially across a driveway (except for two minutes to pick up or drop off passengers)
- If there is fewer than three metres of clear road left for other traffic
- On a footpath, nature strip or reservation (unless the vehicle is a motorcycle or bicycle)
- Across a footpath, bicycle path or passageway or footpath ramp (unless a sign allows it)
- In a no stopping area

TREATING AND CONTROLLING HEAD LICE

A timely reminder to all families. Please use the forthcoming school holidays to check your child's hair for head lice. It is a good opportunity to get on top of this pesky problem. Thank you!

Treating and controlling headlice

health

While children are at school many families will have contact with head lice. The information contained here will help you treat and control head lice.

Catching head lice

Head lice have been around for many thousands of years. Anyone can get head lice.

Head lice are small, wingless, blood sucking insects. Their colour varies from whitish-brown to reddish-brown. Head lice only survive on humans. If isolated from the head they die very quickly (usually within 24 hours).

People get head lice from direct hair to hair contact with another person who has head lice. This can happen when people play, cuddle or work closely together.

Head lice do not have wings or jumping legs so they cannot fly or jump from head to head. They can only crawl.

Finding head lice

Many lice do not cause an itch, so you have to **look** carefully to find them.

Head lice are found on the hair itself and move to the scalp to feed. They have six legs which end in a claw and they rarely fall from the head. Louse eggs (also called nits) are laid within 1.5 cm of the scalp and are firmly attached to the hair. They resemble dandruff, but can't be brushed off.

Lice can crawl and hide. The easiest and most effective way to find them is to follow these steps:

- Step 1 Comb any type of hair conditioner on to dry, brushed (detangled) hair. This stuns the lice and makes it difficult for them to grip the hair or crawl around.
- Step 2 Now comb sections of the hair with a fine tooth, head lice comb.
- Step 3 Wipe the conditioner from the comb onto a paper towel or tissue.
- Step 4 Look on the tissue and on the comb for lice and eggs.
- Step 5 Repeat the combing for every part of the head at least four or five times.

If lice or eggs are found, the hair should be treated.

If the person has been treated recently and you only find empty hatched eggs, you may not have to treat, as the empty eggs could be from a previous episode.

Treating head lice

Treating head lice involves removing lice and eggs from the hair. There are two ways you can do this:

- Buying and using a head lice lotion or shampoo, following the instructions on the product
- Using the conditioner and comb method (described under 'finding head lice') every second day until there have been no live lice found for ten days.

If you choose to use a head lice product always read and follow the instructions provided with the product carefully. The following points may also be helpful:

- Head lice products must be applied to all parts of the hair and scalp.
- No treatment kills all of the eggs so treatment must involve two applications, seven days apart. The first treatment kills all lice; the second treatment kills the lice that may have hatched from eggs not killed by the first treatment.
- Cover the person's eyes while the treatment is being applied. A towel is a good way to do this.
- If you are using a lotion, apply the product to dry hair.
- If you are using a shampoo, wet the hair, but use the least amount of water possible.
- Apply the treatment near the scalp, using an ordinary comb to cover the hair from root to tip. Repeat this several times until all the hair is covered.

There is no need to treat the whole family - unless they also have head lice.

Concentrate on the head - there is no need to clean the house or the classroom.

Only the pillowcase requires washing - either wash it in hot water (at least 60°C) or dry it using a clothes dryer on the hot or warm setting.

Excitement was in the air on Friday 19th August for the Parent Club Discos. The children were dressed in their disco gear and had a fantastic time dancing to a variety of songs. Around 575 children attended the discos which is about 86% of the students who attend Warragul North Primary School. This was a fantastic response and Parent Club appreciate the support. Approximately \$4140 was raised thanks to the long hours put in by a small group of dedicated Parent Club members.


















Term 3 Update

Wow! The Enviro Group has had another busy term in Term 3! Here's what we've been up to:

Food-Waste-Collection Goal Achieved

On our journey of transitioning to a 'Zero Waste' school, the Enviro group has been collecting food waste. We've gathered data about how much we've been collecting since the start of the year. So far, we've collected 1.2 tonnes.

We've also started a fun, new initiative where we compare how much we've collected to the mass of increasingly heavier man-made or natural items. For example, our 1.2 tonnes are the same mass as a small car. Therefore, the school has achieved 'Small-Car Status'! The next goal is to collect the same mass as a hippopotamus (approximately 1.5 tonnes). Our ultimate goal is to collect the same mass as a jumbo jet (we think this is about 412 tonnes)!



The food waste is diverted to multiple sources including our school worm farms, to a local resident's biodigester unit, and to other hot compost systems.

Father's Day Upcycling Project

The Enviro group completed another 'upcycling project' in time for Father's Day. We collected large coffee and milo tins, painted them in dad-appropriate designs, and sprayed a protective coating over them to give dad a gift, made by hand and made with care. These can be used to hold any number of things, from barbeque utensils, to pens and stationary. We hope the dads enjoy them.



Reducing Food Waste at the School Concert

We continued our push for a Zero Waste culture by sending our large food scraps container to the daytime concert rehearsals. Students are beginning to see this more and more often and are becoming to get into the habit of recycling their food waste. They are growing used to the notion that food scraps are not a waste product, but are a regenerative resource that shouldn't be wasted.

Nude Food and Wattle Day

On September 1st, we held a Nude Food Day to coincide with National Wattle Day. Students were asked to wear something yellow to mark the occasion. It was great to see students and staff getting into the spirit of spring by wearing a splash of yellow. Students learnt a number of interesting facts about wattle. For example, there are more than 1,000 species of wattle; they are an incredibly useful plant for building the fertility of soil, and they store carbon extremely well in comparison to many other trees. The French also saw the value in this plant (which they call 'mimosa') long before we did and have been using the oils of the tree in their perfumes for quiet some time.

It was great to see students and their families helping in the fight against waste by bringing in their nude food snacks and lunches. Thanks for your great efforts WNPS!







School Veggie Garden Update

It may look like it's full of weeds (yeah okay, it is), but stay tuned to changes in the school's veggie garden in the near future. There are a number of developments about to go ahead to help improve the fertility and functionality of the space. For the moment, the weeds stay to protect and fertilise the soil.


